





Charlie Mullins: The multi-million pound plumber

Charlie Mullins was <u>worth</u> around £49 million according to the Sunday Times Rich <u>List</u> last year. A far <u>crv</u> from the "two bob* a day" he started out <u>earning</u>, while helping a local <u>plumber</u> in the 1960s. But it was the lessons he learnt then that have been the <u>foundation</u> of his success.

And what a success! Mullins' business – Pimlico Plumbers – made £1.2million in the year to 31 May 2011, almost <u>double</u> the £688,000 it made the year before. The company also donated nearly £100,000 to <u>charity.</u>

It's hard to begrudge** Mullins his <u>achievements</u> when you consider that he started life on the <u>tough</u> Rockingham estate in London. Aged nine he began <u>skipping</u> school and working for a North London plumber called Bill Ellis. He has <u>said</u> that his business <u>principles</u> were modelled on what he learnt from Ellis. "When I was growing up he was my biggest <u>inspiration</u> and he still is today. The success of Pimlico Plumbers is all thanks to that one man."

Learning his trade

Mullins left school at 15 with no <u>academic qualifications</u> and enrolled in a four-year plumbing <u>apprenticeship</u>. Once qualified, he started <u>working</u> for himself, starting out with a bag of second-hand tools, before setting up a plumbing firm in a basement in Pimlico.

Right from the beginning, Mullins wanted to distance himself from plumbers with a reputation for **unreliability** and overcharging. Instead of just being a standard plumber he planned to do things "the right way" – such as doing his best to turn up on time and **treat** his customers fairly. More than 30 years later the main principle behind Pimlico Plumbers **remains** the same. The company **prides** itself as **providing** a high-priced, high-quality **service**.

Giving something back

Mullins hasn't forgotten those with less than himself. Mullins is <u>committed</u> to <u>charity</u> and has set up apprenticeship programmes to offer young people the same chances he had. He is also a patron of the Prince's Trust, <u>raises</u> money for The Rhys Daniels Trust <u>while</u> he ensures his company is actively involved with fundraising for other organisations.

"I've been fortunate and I'm <u>delighted</u> to be able to help others and put something back into <u>society</u> and I <u>hope</u> it can continue for a long time to come," he said.
